Clark's [Graduate School of Geography](#) was established in 1921, and the Clark-owned journal, [Economic Geography](#), continues to be a top ranked journal in both Geography and Economics. The 7<sup>th</sup> GCEG coincides with Clark's Centennial celebration of the journal.

- Worcester, MA

Unlike other mill towns in New England, Worcester was a diversified economy with strengths in machine tool industry, and particularly [abrasives](#). The wire industry took off when infrastructure for telephone and telegraph was developed, including [corset factories](#). Worcester is the site of the [first women's rights convention](#) (1850), also site of [an anarchist ice cream shop](#) (1892).

[Freedom Trail](#), Boston Common (urban park), Newbury Street (shopping district), North End (Italian district), South End (gentrification), [Museum of Fine Arts](#), [Isabel Stewart Gardner Museum](#), [Boston Tea Party Ship](#), [Museum of Science](#), [Fenway Park](#) (home of the baseball team Red Sox), [MIT Museum](#) (highly recommended!). From Boston, you can reach [Salem](#) (famous for the witch trial), [Newburyport](#), [Gloucester](#), and [Rockport](#) by commuter rail, as well as Concord, Lowell and Providence (see below).

An important historical site for the American Revolutionary War and home to American literary giants: Louisa May Alcott's [Orchard House](#) (author of Little Women), [Nathaniel Hawthorne's House](#) (author of House of Seven Gables), [Old Mans](#) (Nathaniel Hawthorne and Ralph Waldo Emerson), [Walden Pond](#), [Minuteman Bikeway](#).

- Blackstone River Heritage Corridor:

The birthplace of American industrial revolution. Biking/hiking trails

Showcasing life of textile manufacturing workers (predominantly French Canadians in Woonsocket)

[Slater Mill](#), Pawtucket, RI (38 miles or 50 min drive)

The first water-powered cotton-mill in the US.

Known for a successful transformation as a post-industrial city; innovative cuisines, home of Brown University, check out old homes at Federal Hill neighborhood, enjoy the urban view from Michael S. Van Leesten Memorial Bridge, best ice cream by the bridge at [Tissy K's](#).

- Newport RI:

Known for stately [Mansions](#) (including Vanderbilt), beaches, site of Newport Folk and Jazz Festivals

Springfield, MA:

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Birthplace of American mass production

Home of Worcester Sox, a minor league of famous Boston Red Sox baseball team; could also serve as a reception venue

[New Bedford](#), MA (75 miles or 1 hour and 22 minute drive)

A coastal city known developed with the [whaling](#) and fishing industry, [New Bedford Whaling Museum](#), Portuguese/Azorean cuisine and historic homes

[Plymouth Rock](#), MA (79 miles or 1 hour and 28 minute drive)

Site of the Mayflower ship landing

Assabet Woolen Mill – former site of Digital Equipment Corporation (DEC), no public entry

Farther away (more than 2 hour drive from Worcester)

Berkshires:

Two hour drive from Worcester features beautiful areas of rural beauty peppered with historical and cultural attractions, such as the town of Stockbridge with [The Mount](#) (home of Pulitzer winning author, Edith Wharton), [Norman Rockwell Museum](#), [Naumkeag](#), hike the [Monument Mountain](#). Also worth visiting are [Hancock Shakers Village](#) in Hancock, and visit [Massachusetts Museum of Contemporary Art](#) (Mass MOCA) in North Adams
